

System Overview

Florida's community-based child welfare system is comprised of a partnership between the Department of Children and Families (DCF), other state agencies, the courts, law enforcement agencies, service providers, and local communities.

There are over four million children in Florida of which most fortunately do not come to the attention of the system. For those children who do enter the system, entry begins with reports of allegations of abuse or neglect made to the Florida Abuse Hotline, operated by DCF. The Florida Abuse Hotline receives in excess of 350,000 child-related calls annually. Calls received are screened to determine if the criteria are met to initiate a protective investigation.


If criteria are met, the report is referred to a local Child Protective Investigations (CPI). Statewide there are over 220,000 protective investigations conducted annually. These investigations are conducted by DCF in 60 counties. In the remaining 7 counties, including Broward, Hillsborough, Manatee, Pasco, Pinellas, Seminole, and Walton, county sheriff's offices perform the investigations. Investigators determine the need for postinvestigation services, including protecting the child through removal and placement in out-of-home care or through case-managed, in-home services (by court order or non-judicially), or through informal voluntary family support services. For SFY 2017-2018, over 36,000 children were served in out-of-home care.

Florida statute requires that post-investigation services be provided through contracting with communitybased care lead agencies (CBCs). There are 17 Community-Based Care (CBC) lead agencies that each provide coverage to specific geographic areas within the 20 Judicial Circuits in Florida. Several lead agencies cover more than one geographic area and areas may include one or multiple counties. In two instances, the CBC lead agency serves two geographic areas under separate contracts, lending to 19 lead agencies displayed within the CBC tables of this report. Although services vary among CBC lead agencies, they have a shared role in participating and ensuring safety, permanency, and well-being for all children in the state.

The monthly Child Welfare Key Indicators Report presents data for the Florida Abuse Hotline, Child Protective Investigations, CBC lead agencies, as well as other key metrics describing the state of the Florida Child Welfare System.



***Black Belt projects were conducted on the Rate of Abuse, Re-entry, and Placement Moves Federal Indicators due to these measures not meeting the national target. The projects were completed in conjunction with state child welfare partners and have been routed to the Florida Institute for Child Welfare for research review as outlined in Florida's continuous quality improvement process. An analysis project is also currently underway on the permanency in 12 months Federal Indicator, which has dropped below the federal target for four of the last five quarters.


The Florida Abuse Hotline offers a variety of methods for citizens to report concerns about children and vulnerable adults. A modification was made within the system, resulting in the tracking of webs and faxes together. Webs were previously represented by the green line within the graph below, however beginning in March 2017, webs were combined with faxes, now represented by the red line.



Seasonality of Hotline Workload

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


Alleged Maltreatment Screening

Total child maltreatment allegations for November 2018 was 17,540. In November 2018, 72.6% of child maltreatment allegations reported were screened-in.

There were 1,831 screened-in special conditions for November 2018. The screen-in percentage for special conditions is 72.3%.




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Crime Intelligence Unit

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The included chart contains Crime Intelligence Unit counts for planned placements, emergency placements, additionals, rechecks, and initials.



Average and Maximum Times to Answer or Abandon




The average wait time before answer increased in November to four minutes and 48 seconds. 88% of calls were answered in 10 minutes or less, falling below the 98% target.




Percent of Calls Abandoned

Average Handling Time Trend Stratification




Recurrence of Hotline Reporting Trends

The following four new measures look at all initial calls (no additional, supplemental) to the Hotline within a month and places them into a monthly cohort based on whether the first call received in the month was screened-in or screened-out. Subsequent initial calls to the Hotline within the following 12 months are captured as recurrence. These monthly screen-in and screen-out cohorts are tracked for recurrence of reporting by child (meaning the child appears again in a Hotline report within the following 12 months) and by perpetrator (meaning the perpetrator on the initial report appears as a perpetrator in another initial report within the following 12 months). The percentage of recurrence of reporting for these four groups are displayed at 3, 6, 9, and 12-month intervals.

31.78% of children with an initial screen-in decision in November 2017 experienced recurrence of reporting over the following 12 months.







Abuse Registry Counselor separations have increased since January 2014. They have now entered a pattern that generates two consecutive months at upper levels followed by one month of decline. Note that the lower level for total separations has been increasing while the upper level has stabilized.





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
Investigative Workload: Incoming, Active, and Backlog Investigations

There was an expected seasonal decline in both incoming investigations and active investigations as of the last day of the month. There has been an 18% decline in incoming investigations month-over-month since 2016 and a 9% decline in the number of active investigations month-over-month since 2016. The Northwest Region currently accounts for 25% of active investigations in Backlog.




Investigative Workload: Stratified by Region

The Central Region has continued to have the lowest backlog from September through November 2018 with the Southern Region close behind. The Northwest Region backlog has experienced a significant increase since August and continues to have the highest backlog at 5.14% for November 2018.




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Alleged Maltreatment Investigations show a declining trend beginning in May 2017 while Special Conditions Referrals have been increasing steadily since 2012.




Special Conditions: Stratified by Type and by County

As observed in the data, the increasing trend in special conditions is largely due to the increase in child-on-child referrals. All other special condition types have remained fairly flat.



Statewide: More Than 20 Active Investigations

The percentage of DCF investigators that were carrying more than 20 active investigations as of the last day of the month declined in November 2018 to 8.48%. The trend has been in a downward phase since October 2016.





In areas where DCF conducts investigations, it is the Northwest Region at 92.1% that lags behind while the other areas of the state are generally solid.




Timeliness Trends

The new DCF standard for this measure as of July 2018 is 90% or higher. Note that this is the second consecutive month that the new 90% or higher standard has been reached.





Stratification Child Investigations Completed Within 60 Days by DCF Circuit and Sheriff's Office 5 of the 24 investigative areas met the 99.0% standard for completing investigations within 60-days and only the Manatee SO and Circuit 16 (the Keys) have been able to meet the standard for the last three 3 months.



These Tableau visualizations are for investigations closed during November 2018. The percentage of children safe with no impending danger continues to be fairly stable.


Impending Danger Threats and Safety Determination

This visualization indicates that some children have been determined "unsafe," yet have no impending danger (pink), while others are determined "safe," yet there is impending danger (dark blue).

This Tableau visualization indicates the percentage of the identified Impending Danger Threats for both safe and unsafe children, by region. Adult functioning continues to be the most significant influential risk factor for unsafe chilldren with Suncoast Region leading at 8.55%.




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
These Tableau visualizations reflect investigations closed during November 2018. The Southern Region is leading with the highest percentage of unsafe children with no placement services at 15.38%

- The visualization on the top indicates that some children have been determined "unsafe," yet have no placement services (red) or are indicated as receiving Family Support Services (lightest blue).
- The visualization on the bottom indicates that some children have been determined "safe," yet were placed in out-ofhome care (violet) or received case-managed in-home services (dark purple).



The following chart provides a trend view of the number of children who have been deemed unsafe, by month of investigation closure, who are receiving Family Support Services or no placement services, as opposed to ongoing, casemanaged services. Each month's data is finalized on the third pull, allowing for a grace period of around 75 days for data entry. The "No Subsequent Services Provided After Investigation Closure" line is a drill down on the children not receiving placement services upon investigative closure. Additionally, a line has been added to identify if there was a face-to-face contact made after investigation closure for those children that had no placement services at investigation closure. In November 2018, 43 of the 59 children who were not receiving placement services upon investigation closure had a face-to-face contact after closure. None of these measures have a set target, but lower is the desired direction.

Number of Unsafe Children Receiving No Placement Services or Family Support Services Upon Investigation Closure




Number of Children Receiving a Face to Face Visit or No Subsequent Placement Services After Investigation Closure for Children Not Receiving



Face to Face Visit After Investigation Closure for Unsafe Children Not Receiving Placement Services Upon Investigation Closure




The percentage of children with no recurrence of maltreatment within 12 months of a verified finding was stable for children with completed investigation in September of 2017 and Florida remained above the national standard of 90.1%. The most recent national data which has been stratified to the state level for this measure is from 2012/2013. Florida would rank 25th among states if comparing current performance to the available 2013 data. Wyoming led all states in 2012/2013 at 97.3%.


There is wide variation among the circuits and sheriff's offices on this indicator. Note that Florida met the national standard for the third quarter of the calendar year for this measure.


The number of Child Protective Investigators that separated from the department has been generally stable since 2016 with the exception two-three peaks. 
Flow from CPI to CBC Lead Agencies



Removals Cumulative Count by SFY




















Family Functioning Assessment-Ongoing Implementation Map



- The percent of children with no verified maltreatment during case-managed in-home services was 97.4%, for July through September 2018. The state continues to exceed the set target for this measure at 95%.
- The percent of children with no verified maltreatment within six months after termination of case-managed services was 95.9% for January through March 2018. The state continues to exceed the set target for this measure at 95%.
- The percent of children with no verified maltreatment within six months of termination of Family Support Services was at 93.9% for those terminating January through March 2018. This measure does not have a set target.


Statewide Trend: Permanency Within 12 Months of Removal







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

Timeliness of Termination of Parental Rights, from Petition to Order





Stratification by CBC Lead Agency





Trends in Group and Residential Care by Age Report The number of children aged 6-12 in group care has increased since 2014.







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
Children in Out-of-Home Care with Prescribed Psychotropic Medications

The statewide percentage of children in out-of-home care with at least one prescribed psychotropic medication on November 29, 2018 was 10.2%. This is down from 11% in November 2016.



Children with Consent for Prescribed Psychotropic Medications

In order to administer psychotropic medication to a foster child, parental consent or a court order must be obtained, unless the child is receiving inpatient services or a physician certifies that delay would be likely to harm the child. On November 29, 2018, the statewide percentage of children with at least one prescribed psychotropic medication where consent was obtained was 98.6% and seven CBCs were at 100%. This is consistent with past observations for this measure.



Dental Services

The statewide percent of children receiving recent dental services increased to 92.8% as of September 30, 2018, but is still below the statewide standard.



Stratification by CBC Lead Agency

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


Average Number of Children Categorized as Missing from Care and Supervision

There was a rebound in the average number and percentage of children categorized as missing from the care and supervision of the state in November. While the average of 190.6 for November 2018 was down 22% from the November 2018 average of 244.6, with a similar number of children in out-of-home and in-home care, the decline does not appear to be inconsistent with general missing children trends. FDLE reported a 16% decline in the number of non-DCF children reported as missing to FDLE between 2017 and 2018.



Child Reports Entered into FSFN within One Working Day

Statewide performance for November 2018 increased slightly to 89.2%. Overall performance for this measure has Μ improved since March 2018 when the statewide percentage was 77.8%. Note the low performance of Eckerd Community Hillsborough, Big Bend CBC and Our Kids Inc. Also note the low number of entries, down from 694 in 2017 to 489 in November 2018. The bulk of the decline appears to be concentrated in the Hillsborough and Miami-Dade areas






Human Trafficking



Human Trafficking Intakes Trend






