



# **DCF Service Structure**

#### Regions, Circuits, Counties, and CBC Lead Agencies



## **System Overview**

Florida's community-based child welfare system is comprised of a partnership between the Department of Children and Families (DCF), other state agencies, the courts, law enforcement agencies, service providers, and local communities.

There are over four million children in Florida of which most fortunately do not come to the attention of the system. For those children who do enter the system, entry begins with reports of allegations of abuse or neglect made to the Florida Abuse Hotline, operated by DCF. The Florida Abuse Hotline receives in excess of 350,000 child-related calls annually. Calls received are screened to determine if the criteria are met to initiate a protective investigation.


If criteria are met, the report is referred to a local Child Protective Investigations (CPI). Statewide there are over 220,000 protective investigations conducted annually. These investigations are conducted by DCF in 61 counties. In the remaining 6 counties, including Broward, Hillsborough, Manatee, Pasco, Pinellas, and Seminole, county sheriff's offices perform the investigations. Investigators determine the need for postinvestigation services, including protecting the child through removal and placement in out-of-home care or through case-managed, in-home services (by court order or non-judicially), or through informal voluntary family support services. For SFY 2016-2017, over 35,000 children were served in out-of-home care.

Florida statute requires that post-investigation services be provided through contracting with communitybased care lead agencies (CBCs). There are 17 Community-Based Care (CBC) lead agencies that each provide coverage to specific geographic areas within the 20 Judicial Circuits in Florida. Several lead agencies cover more than one geographic area and areas may include one or multiple counties. In three instances, the CBC lead agency serves two geographic areas under separate contracts, lending to 20 lead agencies displayed within the CBC tables of this report. Although services vary among CBC lead agencies, they have a shared role in participating and ensuring safety, permanency, and well-being for all children in the state.

The monthly Child Welfare Key Indicators Report presents data for the Florida Abuse Hotline, Child Protective Investigations, CBC lead agencies, as well as other key metrics describing the state of the Florida Child Welfare System.


#### Florida Child Protection System Overview 2016-17 SFY





A modification was made within the system, resulting in the tracking of webs and faxes together. Webs were previously represented by the green line within the graph below, however beginning in March 2017, webs were combined with faxes, now represented by the red line.







The included chart contains Crime Intelligence Unit counts for planned placements, emergency placements, additionals, rechecks, and initials.




The average wait time before answer increased in December (2 minutes 19 seconds). 95% of calls were answered in 10 minutes or less, just shy of meeting the 98% target.










One DCF region, Southern, had a decrease in backlog from September to November 2017, while Northeast, and Northwest regions have three months of increase from September to November 2017.


#### Maltreatment Investigations and Special Conditions Referrals

#### Special Conditions: Stratified by Type and by County


As observed in the data, the increasing trend in special conditions is largely due to the increase in child-on-child referrals. All other special condition types have remained fairly flat.



#### Statewide: More Than 15 Active Investigations

The statewide percent of CPIs and Sheriff Office Investigators with 15 or more active investigations as of November 30, 2017 was 44.3%. This is the fourth consecutive month with an increase and the third consecutive month that this measure was above the DCF standard of 40.0%.



DCF-Circuit 16 is a small investigative area and the Seminole SO has the shortest average open investigative time for in-home investigation with a completed family functioning assessment.

Department-wide efforts to ensure that no DCF CPI is carrying a case load in excess of 26 cases have been extremely successful. As of November 30, 2017, only 35 DCF CPIs were carrying 26 or more active investigations (all types). However, the number of DCF investigators carrying 26+ investigations has been increasing since October 29, 2017.



The statewide percent of alleged victims seen within 24 hours decreased to 89.0% in November 2017. This was above the statewide target of 85.0% or more, and remained slightly higher than what had been observed within the data prior to a recent spike in August 2017.





#### Statewide: Child Investigations Completed Within 60 Days

The state continues to struggle with this measure with 95.9% of investigations being completed within 60 days for September 2017 incoming investigations. This was the 52nd consecutive month where the state failed to reach the target of 99.0%.



Only 6 of the 23 investigative areas met the 99.0% standard for completing investigations within 60-days.




#### Impending Danger Threats and Safety Determination

#### Impending Danger Threats Identified by Safety Determination






#### Percent of Safe Children by Placement Service Type or Family Support Service Upon Investigative Closure




























#### Placement Types Compared to Children in Out-of-Home Care Trend


#### Children in Out-of-Home Care by Placement Type Region: All





Timeliness of Termination of Parental Rights, from Petition to Order







Trends in Group and Residential Care by Age Report The number of children aged 6-12 in group care has increased since 2014. M


















Average Number of Children Categorized as Missing from Care and Supervision

The average daily number of children categorized as missing from the care or supervision of the Department continues to display a strong 12 month oscillating pattern with October 2017 showing an upward trend. Year over year data indicates that the average daily number of children categorized as missing from the care or supervision of the Department increased, moving from an average of 211 in October 2016 (0.59%) to 244 in October 2017 (0.70%).



## Child Reports Entered into FSFN within One Working Day

There is wide variance in the total number of missing child reports that were entered within FSFN and the percentage of missing child reports entered into FSFN within one working day of a CBC learning that a child was missing across the CBCs. On average, of the 694 missing child reports entered into FSFN in October 2017, 89.0% were entered into FSFN within one day of a CBC learning that a child was missing.





#### **Human Trafficking Intakes Trend**





For November 2017, 100% of home inspections and 99.7% of facility inspections were completed within 45 days.




