



# **System Overview**

Florida's community-based child welfare system is comprised of a partnership between the Department of Children and Families (DCF), other state agencies, the courts, law enforcement agencies, service providers, and local communities.

There are over four million children in Florida of which most fortunately do not come to the attention of the system. For those children who do enter the system, entry begins with reports of allegations of abuse or neglect made to the Florida Abuse Hotline, operated by DCF. The Florida Abuse Hotline receives in excess of 350,000 child-related calls annually. Calls received are screened to determine if the criteria are met to initiate a protective investigation.


If criteria are met, the report is referred to a local Child Protective Investigations (CPI). Statewide there are over 220,000 protective investigations conducted annually. These investigations are conducted by DCF in 60 counties. In the remaining 7 counties, including Broward, Hillsborough, Manatee, Pasco, Pinellas, Seminole, and Walton, county sheriff's offices perform the investigations. Investigators determine the need for postinvestigation services, including protecting the child through removal and placement in out-of-home care or through case-managed, in-home services (by court order or non-judicially), or through informal voluntary family support services. For SFY 2017-2018, over 36,000 children were served in out-of-home care.

Florida statute requires that post-investigation services be provided through contracting with communitybased care lead agencies (CBCs). There are 17 Community-Based Care (CBC) lead agencies that each provide coverage to specific geographic areas within the 20 Judicial Circuits in Florida. Several lead agencies cover more than one geographic area and areas may include one or multiple counties. In two instances, the CBC lead agency serves two geographic areas under separate contracts, lending to 19 lead agencies displayed within the CBC tables of this report. Although services vary among CBC lead agencies, they have a shared role in participating and ensuring safety, permanency, and well-being for all children in the state.

The monthly Child Welfare Key Indicators Report presents data for the Florida Abuse Hotline, Child Protective Investigations, CBC lead agencies, as well as other key metrics describing the state of the Florida Child Welfare System.



\*\*\*Black Belt projects were conducted on the Rate of Abuse, Re-entry, and Placement Moves Federal Indicators due to these measures not meeting the national target. The projects were completed in conjunction with state child welfare partners and have been routed to the Florida Institute for Child Welfare for research review as outlined in Florida's continuous quality improvement process. An analysis project is also currently underway on the permanency in 12 months Federal Indicator, which has dropped below the federal target for four of the last five quarters.


The Florida Abuse Hotline offers a variety of methods for citizens to report concerns about children and vulnerable adults. A modification was made within the system, resulting in the tracking of webs and faxes together. Webs were previously represented by the green line within the graph below, however beginning in March 2017, webs were combined with faxes, now represented by the red line.



#### Seasonality of Hotline Workload

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
There were 51,541 total contacts offered for the month of September. "Contacts Offered" include those abandoned by a caller who called back, so both attempts and completed calls from the same individual may be counted.



## **Screening Trends**


#### Alleged Maltreatment Screening

Total child maltreatment allegations for September 2018 was 19,669. In September 2018, 72.8% of child maltreatment allegations reported were screened-in. Since September 2017, there has been a steady decline in the acceptance of screened-in intakes statewide.



#### **Special Conditions Screening**

There were 1,898 screened-in special conditions for September 2018. However, the screen-in percentage for special conditions calls continues to decrease.




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#### Crime Intelligence Unit

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The included chart contains Crime Intelligence Unit counts for planned placements, emergency placements, additionals, rechecks, and initials.






The average wait time before answer increased significantly in September to five minutes and 17 seconds. 95% of calls were answered in 10 minutes or less, falling below the 98% target.




#### Percent of Calls Abandoned

The percent of calls to the Florida Abuse Hotline English Line that are abandoned before answer increased to 17.9% for September 2018, and the percent of Spanish Line abandoned calls increased to 30.1%.



## Average Handling Time Trend Stratification

The Average Handling Time (AHT) of a counselor includes talk time (ACD) and after call work (ACW). Average talk time is 12 minutes 39 seconds and ACW continued around 21-minutes.




## Recurrence of Hotline Reporting Trends


The following four new measures look at all initial calls (no additional, supplemental, or special conditions) to the Hotline within a month and places them into a monthly cohort based on whether the first called received in the month was screened-in or screened-out. Subsequent initial calls to the Hotline within the following 12 months are captured as recurrence. These monthly screen-in and screen-out cohorts are tracked for recurrence of reporting by child (meaning the child appears again in a Hotline report within the following 12 months) and by perpetrator (meaning the perpetrator on the initial report appears as a perpetrator in another initial report within the following 12 months). The percentage of recurrence of reporting for these four groups are displayed at 3, 6, 9, and 12-month intervals.

Recurrence of Hotline Reporting Within 12 Months for Initial Screen-Ins by Child


32.48% of children with an initial screen-in decision in September 2017 experienced recurrence of reporting over the following 12 months.







Abuse Registry Counselor separations were stable at nine for September.





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
Investigative Workload: Incoming, Active, and Backlog Investigations

There was an expected increase in the number of incoming investigations and active investigations as of the last day of the month in September. However, the investigative intake total of 17,066 was in line with a normal September. There was a slight increase to 351 from 328 in the number of investigations in Backlog.




## Investigative Workload: Stratified by Region

The Central Region has continued to have the lowest backlog from July through September 2018. The Southern Region backlog has experienced a significant decrease in backlog from July to September 2018.




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Both Alleged Maltreatment Investigations and Special Conditions Referrals increased slightly in September. September data for 2017 was skewed lower due to the effects of Hurricane Irma making year-over-year comparisons invalid.




## Special Conditions: Stratified by Type and by County

As observed in the data, the increasing trend in special conditions is largely due to the increase in child-on-child referrals. All other special condition types have remained fairly flat.



#### Statewide: More Than 20 Active Investigations

The percentage of DCF investigators that were carrying more than 20 active investigations as of the last day of the month for September increased significantly to 9.9%.



Stratification More Than 20 Active investigations by DCF Circuit and Sheriff's Office

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
Note that the most dramatic increases in the percentage of CPIs carrying 21+ active investigations is generally located in those areas where the sheriff office conducts investigations.

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Department-wide efforts to ensure that no DCF CPI is carrying a caseload greater than 26 cases have been extremely successful. As of August 29, 2018, only one DCF CPI was carrying 26 or more active investigations (all types).




#### **Timeliness Trends**

The new DCF standard for this measure as of July 2018 is 90% or higher. The data has been adjusted to reflect compliance against the new 90% measure.





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

This visualization indicates that some children have been determined "unsafe," yet have no impending danger (pink), while others are determined "safe," yet there is impending danger (dark blue).


#### Impending Danger Threats and Safety Determination for Investigations Closed During September 2018

Percent of FFAs - Investigations by Impending Danger Threats and Safety Determination




#### Impending Danger Threats Identified by Safety Determination

This Tableau visualization indicates the percentage of the identified Impending Danger Threats for both safe and unsafe children, by region.




- The visualization on the top indicates that some children have been determined "unsafe," yet have no placement services (red) or are indicated as receiving Family Support Services (lightest blue).
- The visualization on the bottom indicates that some children have been determined "safe," yet were placed in out-ofhome care (violet) or received case-managed in-home services (dark purple).

# Percent of UnSafe Children by Placement Service Type or Family Support Services Upon Investigative Closure




# Percent of Safe Children by Placement Service Type or Family Support Services Upon Investigative Closure




## Unsafe Children Receiving No Placement Services or Family Support Services Upon Investigative Closure and No Placement Services After Investigation Closure

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The following chart provides a trend view of the number of children who have been deemed unsafe, by month of investigation closure, who are receiving Family Support Services or no placement services, as opposed to ongoing, casemanaged services. Each month's data is finalized on the third pull, allowing for a grace period of around 75 days for data entry. The "No Subsequent Services Provided After Investigation Closure" line is a drill down on the children not receiving placement services upon investigative closure. Additionally, a line has been added to identify if there was a face-to-face contact made after investigation closure for those children that had no placement services at investigation closure. In September 2018, 62 of the 109 children who were not receiving placement services upon investigation closure had a face-to-face contact after closure. None of these measures have a set target, but lower is the desired direction.




The percentage of children with no recurrence of maltreatment within 12 months of a verified finding was stable for children with completed investigation in July of 2017 and Florida remained above the national standard of 90.1%. The most recent national data which has been stratified to the state level for this measure is from 2012/2013. Florida would rank 25<sup>th</sup> among states if comparing current performance to the available 2013 data. Wyoming led all states in 2012/2013 at 97.3%.



OStratification by DCF Circuit and Sheriff's Office

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
There is wide variation among the circuits and sheriff's offices on this indicator. Note that Florida met the national standard for the fourth quarter of the SFY for this measure.



## **CPI Workforce Monthly Separations**

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
The number of Child Protective Investigators that separated from the department in August 2018 continued to decline.



#### CPI Time in Classification

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The addition of new CPI positions is skewing this data towards inexperience within the CPI work force. As these new positions are filled and move through the standard workforce attrition cycle it is expected that the displayed counts and percentages will stabilize in the 20.0%-25.0% range for CPI positions that were vacant or had less than 6-months experience and the 45.0% to 47.0% range for CPI positions that were vacant or had less than 1-year experience.







The year-over-year cumulative count of removals for September 2018 were 3,986.

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

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There remains wide variation among circuits and sheriff's offices on this indicator. Removal rates range from 3.5 to 10.8 per 100 alleged victims.






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Percentage of Children in Licensed Substitute Care that were Title IV-E Eligible or in a Non-Reimbursable Placement

The percentage of children in out-of-home care that are deemed to be Title IV-E eligible or that are in a non-reimbursable placement remained relatively flat, in the range of 67.0%.



Percentage of Children with a Goal of Adoption that are Title IV-E or TANF Eligible and Count of Children with a Goal of Adoption Awaiting Finalization or have No Applicable Eligibility The percentage with a goal of adoption that were classified as Title IV-E or TANF eligible has stabilized in the range of 55.0% after declining since January 2015. Note the increase in children awaiting finalization by the CIC or where the child has no eligibility determination since June 2016. As of September 2017, approximately 1/3 of these pending eligibility cases were located within the Eckerd Community Alternatives (Pasco & Pinellas Counties) system of care.





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
There were 24,235 children in out-of-home (OHC) care on September 30, 2018, which remained stable compared to the consistent upward trend in OHC observed since the middle of 2013. The trend for children receiving in-home services has remained relatively flat for three years, with 11,143 children receiving in-home services on September 30, 2018.



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
There continues to be variation among circuits regarding in-home and out-of-home care services, with the widest variation occurring in the use of Family Support Services.





#### Placement Types Compared to Children in Out-of-Home Care Trend


As of September 30, 2018, there were 24,235 children in out of home care with 10,501 in relative care placement, 7,296 in a licensed family foster home, 3,139 in non-relative care, 2,044 in licensed group care, and 1,114 in other placements.

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

Ochild Safety Trends: Comparison of Three Indicators

Children continue to be safer while receiving services than after termination of services:

- The percent of children with no verified maltreatment during case-managed in-home services was 97.4%, for April through June 2018. The state continues to exceed the set target for this measure at 95%.
- The percent of children with no verified maltreatment within six months after termination of case-managed services was 96.4% for October through December 2017. The state continues to exceed the set target for this measure at 95%.
- The percent of children with no verified maltreatment within six months of termination of Family Support Services was at 95.3% for those terminating October through December 2017. This measure does not have a set target.

Statewide performance for period April through June 2018 was 97.4%, and all lead agencies exceeded the state target.

This measure is generated by taking the total number of reports with at least one verified maltreatment and dividing it by the total number of days in foster care for all children, with the result multiplied by 100,000 to calculate the rate of victimization per 100,000 days in foster care. The data for this quarter continues to show wide variation among the CBCs, with statewide performance meeting the national standard of 8.50 or less. The most recent national data which has been stratified to the state level for this measure is from 2013. Florida would rank 36<sup>th</sup> among states if comparing current performance to the available 2013 data. Wyoming led all states in 2013 at 1.16.


# Statewide Trend: Permanency Within 12 Months of Removal (9)





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

Timeliness of Termination of Parental Rights, from Petition to Order









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
Children in Out-of-Home Care with Prescribed Psychotropic Medications





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
Average Number of Children Categorized as Missing from Care and Supervision

#### Child Reports Entered into FSFN within One Working Day



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The majority of children, 68.4% in September, that are classified as missing from the care and supervision of the Department are located in less than three days.






